

One Nation Under God-The Birth of Our Nation and Founder

In celebration of Columbus Day on October 14, 2002, let us remember not only the discovery of this great land of ours, but our allegiance and founder of the Knights of Columbus.

Approximately 50 years ago, the words "ONE NATION UNDER GOD" were added to the United States pledge of allegiance. It was the persevering efforts of the Knights of Columbus that made it possible. The movement to add the words "under God"



officially began on April 22, 1951, when the Knights of Columbus Board of Directors adopted a resolution to add the words to the pledge being recited at all meetings of the Fourth Degree. The role of the KC in getting the words added to the pledge became a matter of government record on July 13, 1954, under President Dwight D. Eisenhower. In a letter, the president thanked the KC for its role in having the words added to the pledge.

This year, the KC also celebrates the 150th anniversary of the birth of Father Michael J. McGivney, founder of the Knights

of Columbus. Father McGivney was only 29 years old when he founded the Order. The first Knights were mostly in their early to mid-30s. Our council consists of relatively young members, much like our founding Brother Knights. Our council has accomplished a lot, especially supporting the establishment of a new parish. Brother Knights, you are to be commended on the accomplishments and the future plans and endeavors that lie ahead. Let us brace the future with the spirit of our founding Brother Knights, as we commemorate Columbus Day and reflect on our mission to serve our churches-St. Mark and Pax Christi.




Pax Christi Ministry Fair

Scars

Some years ago on a hot summer day in south Florida a little boy decided to go for a swim in the old swimming hole behind his house. In a hurry to dive into the cool water, he ran out the back door, leaving behind his shoes, socks, and shirt as he went. He flew into the water not realizing that as he swam toward the middle of the lake, an alligator was swimming toward the shore. His mother in the house was looking out the window saw the two as they got closer and closer together. In utter fear, she ran toward the water, yelling to her son as loudly as she could. Hearing her voice, the little boy became alarmed and made a u-turn to swim to his mother. It was too late. Just as he reached her, the alligator reached him. From the dock, the mother grabbed her little boy by the arms just as the alligator snatched his leas. That began an incredible tug-ofwar between the two. The alligator was much stronger than the mother, but the mother was much too passionate to let go. A farmer happened to drive by, heard her screams, raced from his truck, took aim and shot the alligator.

Remarkably, after weeks and weeks in the hospital the little boy survived. His legs were extremely scarred by the vicious attack. And, on his arms, were deep scratches where his mother's fingernails dug into his flesh in her effort to hand on to the son she loved. The newspaper reporter who interviewed the boy after the trauma, asked if he would show him his scars.

The boy lifted his pant legs. And then, with obvious pride, he said to the reporter "But look at my arms. I have great scars on my arms, too. I have them because my Mom wouldn't let go".

We can identify with that little boy. We have scars, too. No, not from an alligator, or anything quite so dramatic. But the scars perhaps of a painful past. Some of those scars are unsightly and have caused deep regret. But some wounds are because God has refused to let go. Sometimes we foolishly wade into dangerous situations. The swimming hole of life is filled with peril and we forget that the enemy is waiting to attack. That's when the tug-of-war begins, and if you have the scars of God's Love on your arms be very, very grateful. God did not and will not let you go.


