XI. Lecturer – Alan Brown/Ben Stancati

The Rev. Robert F. Houlihan S.J. Educator Series

This month's discussion was given by Bernard Stancati. The talk centered on the 100 year anniversary of the start of World War I (WWI), which was August 1914. To this day its dimensions, impact, and scope are still shocking, with many lessons still left to be learned. During the summer of 2014, while events were occurring commemorating the start of the war, German Catholic Bishops were holding a conference in Berlin, the objective of which was multifaceted. While honoring the war dead and victims of the war was of primary concern there were others of equal importance, such as the need to overcome destructive self-interests. Another centered on the need of Christian churches to acknowledge a shared guilt for the role they played in the conflict. Reflecting on their own history, the bishops argued the point that late 18th century and early 20th century Europe saw a rise in nationalistic tendencies that led to national rivalries

and ultimately to a war of previously unimaginable proportions. Unfortunately the Catholic faithful and the clergy at all levels within the church, along with other Christian denominations, got caught up in the war mongering and nationalism. Unfortunately the churches recognized too late that this was a sinful approach, and consequently failed in their responsibility to the victims, both combatants and non-combatants. From a current events perspective, the German bishops were concerned about the noted rise in nationalistic attitudes and anti-Semitic activities across various parts of Europe and elsewhere. With deep sense of their own history, this particular group of German Catholic bishops has become advocates for action, urging German law enforcement officials to act with determination against hate crimes. The also urged Christians of all denominations to always take the side of Jews against insults and attacks regardless of what one's own personal views may be concerning Israel's policies. Therefore, by using the 100th year anniversary of WWI as a learning tool, the intended goal was to help all Christians understand that as a community of the faithful we must be vigilant and stand guard against those same tendencies that lead to such a devastating and destructive conflict.

OSCE Conference Report: Patriotism Activity

Who: FN, Assembly 3353

What: Attended the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE) Conference

Where: Warsaw Poland When: Sept 29, 30, 2015

How Many: Two Knights of Columbus, over 600 people attending

This Conference is the only one in the world that I know of where private NGO's can sit down with representatives of Heads of State and voice their grievances and opinions. The United States, Germany, the Russian Federal Republic, The Vatican and Turkey were there, to name a few that I can recall.

The Conference lasts two weeks, usually the last two weeks in September. Each day of the Conference has two sessions, morning and an afternoon. The Agenda is published, and we usually pick only the days that cover the topics with which we are concerned.

This year, we addressed the following topics:

<u>Tuesday Sept 29, working session 12</u>: Combatting hate crimes and ensuring effective protection against discrimination

<u>Tuesday Sept 29, Working Session 13:</u> Combatting hate crimes and ensuring effective protection against discrimination (continued)

Wednesday Sept 30, Working Session 14: Tolerance and non-discrimination II, including:

- Combating racism, xenophobia and discrimination, also focusing on intolerance and discrimination against Christians and members of other religions
- Combatting anti-Semitism
- Combatting intolerance and discrimination against Muslims

Wednesday Sept 30, Working Session 15: Fundamental freedoms II (continued), including:

- Freedom of thought, conscience, religion or belief

Over 90 different entities were represented. The Conference limits the speaker's list to 50. So we had to hustle to get signed up in order to present. Each address could only be two minutes long.

The room had screens displaying the twitter feeds concerning the Conference. It was a manifestation of the undercurrent of consciousness of the proceedings, which wasn't always cordial.

Though we were there under the auspices of other Organizations, two of us were Knights of Columbus and were making presentations in defense of Liberty.
