XI. Lecturer - Alan Brown/Ben Stancati

The Rev. Robert F. Houlihan S.J. Educator Series

Alan Brown led this month's discussion, which centered on two saintly men, both of their feast day's are in November. One is St. Martin of Tours (316? - 397), and the other is St. Martin de Porres (1579 – 1639). St. Martin of Tours was a fourth century equivalent of a modern day "conscientious objector, and first in a series of saints who was not martyred. Martin very much wanted to and eventually did become a monk. Through a series of fateful circumstances he was maneuvered into being a bishop. In that role he fought paganism as well as pleading for mercy to heretics. He was also ordained an exorcist and worked with great zeal against the Arians and their pagan beliefs. Additionally, Martin of Tours has been credited with the establishment of what may have been the first French monastery. Standing up to the powers to be, he rejected Bishop Ithacis's principle of putting heretics to death, and spoke out against the intrusion of the emperor into such matters. Through force of will and effort, he did prevail in convincing the emperor to spare the life of the heretic Priscillian, believing that cooperation with Ithacis in other areas would help end the persecution of Priscillian followers. Nevertheless, for these actions Martin was accused of the same heresy and Priscillian was executed after all. Over time Martin's conscious troubled him concerning his decision to seek accommodation with the emperor. He died in 397.

St. Martin de Porres was born of a Spanish father, a grandee of Peru, and a free black Panamanian mother, they were never married. Baptismal records of mixed race children during the time of de Porres used a plethora of cold and insensitive legal terminology such as — "Father unknown," "Half-breed," or "war souvenir." Like many others, Martin de Porres might have developed into a bitter and resentful person, yet he did not. Instead, the historical narrative seems to suggest that even as a child he gave both his heart and his goods to the poor and despised. Being of dark skin Martin was ignored by his father until the age of eight. Yet after the birth of

his sister his father abandoned the family, thus forcing them into abject poverty at the lowest levels of Lima's society. At 12 years of age, he apprenticed with a barber-surgeon. Finding this wanting, he eventually applied to the Dominicans to be a "lay helper," feeling himself unworthy to be a religious leader. After nine years of leading a life of penance, charity and humility the Dominicans requested that he make a full religious profession. Being subjected to racism he fought hard against it and worked tirelessly up unto his death to treat and help all people, regardless of skin color. While his nights were filled with prayer and penance his days were filled with nursing the sick and caring for the poor. Martin de Porres was instrumental in the founding of an orphanage and taking care of slaves brought over from Africa. Reflecting on de Pore's life, the irony for us is that racism is like a pollutant, a sin of the world, and everyone's responsibility, yet apparently the fault of no one. Therefore, one would be hard pressed to find a more fitting patron of Christian forgiveness, for those discriminated against, and Christian justice, on the part of reformed racists, than Martin de Porres. He died in 1639 and was canonized by Saint John XXIII in 1962.

Subject: Colorado State Knights of Columbus "Pennies From Heaven" Program

To: All Grand Knights, District Deputies and State Officers

It is now time for the annual Pennies From Heaven letter. For those who do not know of this program, it was started 26 years ago as a way to help the State K of C raise funds for the many charity requests it receives. At that time, the State K of C did not have any funds set aside to honor these requests. Since this program commenced the State K of C has also added the Fund Crazr football as a source of charity funds.

This Pennies from Heaven program relies solely on the councils support. This past year (May 2014 to April 2015) the councils contributed over \$14,142 bringing the 25 years total to over \$222,000. The money collected is disbursed out each year and not placed in a savings account. Here is where the money went (\$14,142 less the \$4,500 money from the annual auction of the "Pennies" containers that will be paid at the 2016 State convention). The \$9,642 this year plus the \$3,050 from the 2014 containers paid at the State convention this year attributed to the \$12,692 charities donations.

Worthy Grand Knight,

Christians in the Middle East face persecution and extinction simply for their belief in the one who taught us to love one another. Despite the genocidal persecution against them, they continue to be an inspiration, as they remain true to their faith and bear witness to the love of God and neighbor. Yet, despite their great witness, they need our solidarity and support. As Knights of Columbus, we will provide it.

To date, we have donated more than \$4 million to relief efforts in Iraq and Syria through the Knights of Columbus Christian Refugee Relief Fund. We have also launched a website and released commercials to raise awareness of the crisis. However, more assistance is needed.

I ask that your council help us meet this ongoing need by participating in our refugee cross program. Order 5-inch olive wood crosses (\$5 each, minimum order 10), crafted by Christians in the Holy Land. The crosses may then be distributed in your community, for a suggested donation of \$10, with the net proceeds of the sale given to the Christian Refugee Relief Fund. Work with your chaplain or pastor to lead the community in regular prayers for the refugees. These blessings show unity with our brothers and sisters in the Middle East and continues to highlight their plight.

Your council should participate in this initiative for three reasons: To collect funds to help these refugees, raise consciousness of this tragedy and encourage other groups to become involved, and provide sustainability to our support of persecuted Christians.

These crosses are a symbol of our solidarity with these suffering brothers and sisters in the faith and should be a daily reminder in our homes to pray for them.

To these order crosses, use the enclosed flyer or contact our Supply Department (203-752-4214 or supply@kofc.org). While the donation of cross-sale proceeds is not tax deductible, those wishing to give a tax-deductible contribution to the Christian Refugee Relief Fund can do so by visiting christiansatrisk.org. Also, every council that sells 50 or more crosses will fulfill two of the four service criteria under the Church Activities section of the Columbian Award.

The Cross of Christ is a symbol of suffering, of unity, and of hope. Please join your brother Knights offering spiritual and material assistance to these victims of crimes against humanity.
