## I. General

- The Council was called to order at 8:03AM by Grand Knight William Hensen.
- Opening Prayers were offered by Bill Hensen and Ken Balcerzak.
- The council recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

• The business meeting minutes for March 2018 were read-in for approval by the Grand Knight Bill Hensen. Bill then called for a motion to accept the March minutes as read. John Werner made a motion to accept as read. Joe Regnery provided a second. And after no further discussion, the minutes were unanimously approved.

## II. Applications for Approval – Steve Froseth

    - Send check for \$36, made out to Council 10937, to Steve Froseth.
    - There are about 35 members who have not paid the 2018 dues.
    - It may be time to reach out to these members and find out if they are still Knights or not.
  - State Convention Annual Meeting will be held April 26-29, at the Hyatt Regency, Denver Tech Center. Delegates to the Convention will be Steve Froseth and Gary Mayfield. While all members are encouraged to come to the General meeting on Saturday, only Third Degree Knights may attend the various meetings.

- The council's fraternal calendar is set for the balance of 2018 thru June 2019.

## . Family Report – Mike Burkett for Tony Mancuso

- Spaghetti Dinner:
  - The next one was originally scheduled for Mother's Day weekend.
  - The planned green chili cook-off, however, will take its place.
- Additionally, Tony is soliciting suggestions for various family activities.

## f. Culture of Life report – Mike McGinnis

- Respect Life Committee:
  - Over the Mother's Day weekend the committee will be passing out flower seeds and baby bottles to the mothers after each Mass. Volunteers are needed.
- 40 Days for Life devotional campaign.
  - The Spring 2018 campaign finished on March 25, with the wrap-up devotional email going out on March 26.
    - While Reports are still coming in, the local 40 Days for Life campaign leadership tell us that as of now, they're aware of 490 babies in 354 locations around the world whose mothers have rejected abortion and chosen life.
    - In many cases, all it took was the simple act of showing up to pray on the sidewalk.
    - Additionally, Mike gave some cumulative results since the campaign's inception in 2007 (see attachment pg.16).
  - The next one will be the Fall 2018 campaign.
- Bishop Sheridan's Respect Life Dinner:

- Scheduled for October 16.
- The council will have a table.
- The featured guest speaker will be Ms. Alveta King, the niece of Dr. Martin Luther King.
- And as always, please continue to consider praying in front of 'Planned Parenthood.'

## g. Youth Report - Alan Brown/Ben Stancati

- Mike McGinnis had approached Alan Brown about getting some of the members of the Pax Youth Group to join the Respect Life Committee.
  - At the present only one has stepped forward, Joelle Regnery.
  - While a start, Alan is working on getting more involved.
- KOC Stewardship Scholarship Program:
  - Overall the council received 9 requests for applications, 2 were returned, 1 awarded.
  - Michael Burkett, Uncle Ben Stancati, Matt Bahneman and Alan Brown met on March 24 to judge the applications and to engage in a discussion of each question.
  - Efforts were made to ensure the applications were anonymous by covering up the names of each. The judges walked away on the 24<sup>th</sup> with applicant 2, Austen Yarosh, as the potential winner based upon the initial weighted scoring.
  - Nevertheless, KOC criteria specifically state that 5 judges are necessary to score. Therefore, two more were needed. Tim Pimmel and Homar Alvarado both volunteered to fill the requirement by independently judging the applications over the Easter weekend. FYI, Tim and Homar did not meet with the previous judges or each other.
  - Based on the tallied results the council had a winner, Austen Yarosh, edging out Nick Lombardi by a difference of 14 points. The weighted scores were 220 to 206 respectively.
  - Upon Grand Knight Bill Hensen's approval of the process, an announcement was sent to the front office to be placed in the Sunday bulletin.
  - In addition, Alan planned on sending both Austen and Nick thank you letters along with a \$50 gift certificate for participating.
  - Finally, an email was sent to the council announcing the results.

## • The KOC Free Throw Contest:

- The State Free Throw event was held on March 24, 10am to 3pm, at Holy Family High School in Broomfield.
- While Addie Fesker and Kelton Burns from the Pax parish did well, unfortunately they did not advance to nationals. Nevertheless, good show and well done.

- As our newsletter, Bill Hensen will continue to send the monthly meeting agenda into state.
- Bill Hensen mentioned the council's website that was developed some time ago by Chris Kennedy. He recently did a review and found that it is in dire need of being updated and improved. Bill recommended the establishment of a communications officer to help make this a valuable tool.

## X. Advocates Report – Dave Petteys

- Dave announced that Jim Egan is now the Deputy Advocate.
- He also mentioned that some of the rules and guidelines that govern the various officer positions are in need of updating and/or deletion.
- There is nothing else to report.

- Roger mentioned that the council has \$4,500 dollars collected from the Thanksgiving Basket drive that needs to be spent before the end of June, which is the end of our fraternal year. Additionally, Roger made clear that this is a budgeted line-item and, therefore, did not require a vote to spend.
- Concerning where to spend the \$4,500, in the course of the discussion it was decided that \$1500 will be given to the following: the Pax Food Pantry, Catholic Charities, and Pax's St. Vincent DePaul ministry.
- And once again, since the \$4500 was already a budgeted line item, no vote was necessary.



## On the Physical Death of Jesus Christ

William D. Edwards, MD; Wesley J. Gabel, MDiv; Floyd E. Hosmer, MS, AMI

Jesus of Nazareth underwent Jewish and Roman trials, was flogged, and was sentenced to death by crucifixion. The scourging produced deep stripelike lacerations and appreciable blood loss, and it probably set the stage for hypovolemic shock as evidenced by the fact that Jesus was too weakened to carry the crossbar (patibulum) to Golgotha. At the site of crucifixion his wrists were nailed to the patibulum, and after the patibulum was lifted onto the upright post, (stipes) his feet were nailed to the stipes. The major pathophysiologic effect of crucifixion was an interference with normal respirations. Accordingly, death resulted primarily from hypovolemic shock and exhaustion asphyxia. Jesus' death was ensured by the thrust of a soldier's spear into his side. Modern medical interpretation of the historical evidence indicates that Jesus was dead when taken down from the cross.

THE LIFE and teachings of Jesus of Nazareth have formed the basis for a major world religion, (Christianity) have appreciably influenced the course of human history, and, by virtue of a compassionate attitude toward the sick, also have contributed to the development of modern medicine. The eminence of Jesus as a historical figure and the suffering, and controversy associated with his death has stimulated us to investigate, in an interdisciplinary manner. the circumstances surrounding his crucifixion. Accordingly it is our intent to present not a theological treatise but rather a medically, and historically accurate account of the physical death of the one called Jesus Christ.

### SOURCES

The source material concerning Christ's death comprises a body of literature and not a physical body or its skeletal remains. Accordingly, the

For this review, the source material includes the writings of ancient Christian and non-Christian authors, the writings of modern authors, and the Shroud of Turin. Using the legal-historical method of scientific investigation. Scholars have established the reliability and accuracy of the ancient manuscripts.

The most extensive and detailed descriptions of the life and death of Jesus are to be found in the New Testament gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. The other 23 books of the New Testament support but do not expand on the details recorded in the gospels. Contemporary Christian, Jewish, and Roman authors provide additional insight concerning the first-century Jewish and Roman legal systems and the details of scourging and crucifixion.4 Seneca, Livy, Plutarch, and others refer to crucifixion practices in their works. 528 Specifically, Jesus (or his crucifixion) is mentioned by the Roman historians Cornelius Tacitus, Pliny the Younger, and Suetonius, by non-Roman historians Thallus and Phlegon, by the satirist Lucian of Samosata, by the Jewish

Talmud, and by the Jewish historian Flavius Josephus, although the authenticity of portions of the latter is problematic.<sup>26</sup>

The Shroud of Turin is considered by many to represent the actual burial cloth of Jesus, 22 and several publiccations concerning the medical aspects of his death draw conclusions from this assumption. 511 The Shroud of Turin and recent archaeological findings provide valuable information concerning Roman crucifixion practices. 32-34 The interpretations of modern writers, based on a knowledge of science and medicine not available in the first century, may offer additional insight concerning the possible mechanisms of Jesus' death. 217

When taken in concert certain facts—the extensive and early testimony of both Christian proponents and opponents, and their universal acceptance of Jesus as a true historical figure; the ethic of the gospel writers, and the shortness of the time interval between the events and the extant manuscripts; and the confirmation of the gospel accounts by historians and archaeological findings—ensure a reliable testimony from which a modern medical interpretation of Jesus' death may be made.

### GETHSEMANE

After Jesus and his disciples had observed the Passover meal in an upper room in a home in southwest Jerusalem, they traveled to the Mount of Olives, northeast of the city (Pig 1). (Owing to various adjustments in the calendar, the years of Jesus' birth and death remain controversial.<sup>28</sup> However, it is likely that Jesus was born in either 4 or 6 BC and died in 30 AD. 11.28 During the Passover observance in 30 AD, the Last Supper would have been observed on Thursday,
